2017 Ring Issue

Rings (Blue) for 2017 will be available for purchase as from 15 December 2016. The cost of the rings is 50 cents each in multiples of ten.

Members should either purchase or order their **total** 2017 ring requirements early in 2017 as there will only be one opportunity for NEBS to purchase additional rings in 2017. This is likely to be before the middle of the year. NEBS will only order additional rings if there is a **known** shortfall for 2017.

A few members under estimated their 2016 ring requirements. However they were fortunate that there were several members who have had a poor breeding season and who had surplus rings that could be transferred between members. It should not be expected that surplus rings from other members will always be available.

Members should note that the internal diameter of the 2017 rings is 4.4mm compared to the 2016 rings which were 4.2mm.

BREEDING ROOM PROBLEMS

It is with great anticipation that we pair up our birds each year. Sometimes we are rewarded with quality chicks for the show bench and sometimes not. Some of the many and varied problems that you are confronted with during the breeding season can be very frustrating at times and it is very easy to become despondent. After sixteen years of breeding and exhibiting budgies and despite some success on the show bench, almost every year I ask myself, why am I doing this? Do I really need all this frustration and disappointment when I am supposed to be enjoying retirement? Only persistence and a focus on the successes rather than the disappointments get me through each year. Successes can by small, such as getting a place in a class at a club show or even successfully breeding a particular colour or variety for the first time. The major successes will come after that if you are prepared to persevere.

All breeders, no matter who, will have successes and disappointments each and every year. However it is clear that the better the quality of your birds the more likely you are to have problems in the breeding room. So it is important not to let the disappointments get you down. Talk to other breeders for advice and support. This is particularly important for Novice breeders as too many disappointments in the early years of breeding can quickly extinguish the light at the end of the tunnel. It is for this reason that I suggest that Novice breeders should first "learn the trade" by using lesser quality birds as you are less likely to have problems with these birds.

Listed below are many of the problems that I have already experienced since pairing my birds up in July this year. Unfortunately this list has pretty much now become the expectation for each breeding season.

- Maiden hens not feeding chicks this is my most frustrating breeding problem
- Infertile eggs all or several eggs per nest
- Only one fertile egg in a nest of 6 or 7 eggs often the last egg
- Dead-in-Shell chicks
- Addled eggs all or several eggs per nest
- Chicks dying at three to four weeks with full crops why?
- Chicks dying at two and three days possibly yellowbelly?
- Chicks dying with air filled crops
- Eggs damaged or destroyed Hens eating eggs
- No eggs laid
- Hens laying eggs in nest but not sitting on them
- Eggs laid on floor of breeding cage
- Soft shell eggs
- Hens dying suddenly in nest box but were not egg bound
- Sick hens deserting nest of fertile eggs
- Cocks being attacked by hens
- Chick killed by cock after it left the nest
- Chick dying suddenly after transfer to nursery cage
- Chicks with displaced hips
- Chicks being feather plucked
- Chick with French Moult

Many of these problems were discussed at a recent general meeting and it helps to know that the problem is not you but the birds themselves. However many of the problems can be managed to lessen their impact. Talking to other breeders can help you identify appropriate strategies for managing these problems. Unfortunately, other problems are totally beyond our control.



ALBINO: Bird of the month for November

First of all, let's focus on the white unmarked red-eyed budgerigar that we all instantly recognise as the Albino. Ideally, to meet The Standard, Albinos are bred on a grey background to avoid blue suffusion and the associated colour penalty. Visible blue suffusion in the absence of grey factor can be exacerbated by the presence of dark and violet factor. The heavier the suffusion in the eyes of the judge, the heavier the penalty.

There are two other departures from The Standard that are penalised. Markings can be visible on the wings. Cheek patches can be lightly coloured. Thankfully these days we rarely hear the myth that such birds have been bred through Cinnamonwings. Cinnamonwing Albinos would in fact be Lacewings and if the Cinnamonwing mutation has not been passed on it cannot be responsible for visible cinnamon features. A more likely explanation might be minimal leakage of melanin associated with residual tyrosinase activity (see below) possibly if the Albino is masking what would otherwise be a heavily melanised flecked bird or double factor grey. What do Albino breeders think?

In summary, the ideal varietal features for the Albino are snow white body free from any visible markings, a white cheek patch, white tail quill and white tail feather. Likely Albinos bred on an Opaline and/or Spangle background are less susceptible to the intrusion of blue body colour suffusion since both Opaline and Spangle act as mild colour modifiers that slightly mute body colour. All the above covers the basics, but the story doesn't end there.

Delving a little deeper, it is known that throughout the animal kingdom the pink eyed albino mutation deactivates the gene that encodes the enzyme tyrosinase. This blocks the pathway that converts the amino acid tyrosine to melanin and this mutation in budgerigars is the Ino. The body in the blue series is white, as discussed above, since the unrelated gene that controls the synthesis of the yellow pigment psittacofulvin is also deactivated. The body in the green series with the wildtype activity of the psittacofulvin gene is yellow giving us the familiar Lutino, which technically is an Albino due to the underlying biochemical pathway that effectively blocks most if not all formation of melanin. The underlying "white" is overlaid with yellow pigment. Partial deactivation of the psittacofulvin gene, the gene that confers colour through the amount of yellow pigmentation produced, gives us the Yellow Faced Albino. Although now well entrenched, the name Yellow Face is a misnomer for this mutation. As the bird matures the pale yellow tinge washes through the body, which is easily seen in the so called self-coloured or partially de-melanised budgerigar varieties, but somewhat hidden in the fully melanised varieties (Normals) or near fully melanised varieties (Opalines, Cinnamonwings and Spangles).

The Albino class in present day show schedules is designed for the pure white blue series version of the red eyed Albino. In earlier years the Albino and Lutino were combined in the Ino class in show schedules, since they are members of the same variety, the Ino. The Yellow Faced colour version of the Ino in earlier years was benched with the Yellow Faced Blue class when the colour Yellow Faced Blue was misplaced within the varieties, between Spangle and Fallow, in the National Matrix. This was perhaps understandable prior to knowledge of what causes the colours green, blue and blues with yellow faces. But we rarely saw Yellow Faced Albinos in the Yellow Faced Blue class since exhibitors knew that even if they bred them accidentally or otherwise that because of the yellow body suffusion they were not competitive against the melanised Yellow Faced Blue varieties of Normal, Opaline and Cinnamonwing.

The Ino was subsequently separated into two of its colours, the Green Series (Lutino) and the Blue Series (Albino) because the class was regularly dominated by the Lutino. Once separated, that encouraged Albino breeders and now including at national level the Albinos are often seen to be superior to the Lutinos. The Yellow Faced Blue Series version of the Albino never fared well in the Yellow Faced Blue class because of the yellow tinge through the body, based on the same principle that is supposed to disadvantage Single Factor Golden Faced Blues if The Standard is read correctly. Since elevating Yellow Faced Blue into the section of the National Matrix where the Normals are now listed in all colours, including Yellow Faced Blue, The Standard mandates that the Yellow Faced Albino fares no better on the show bench now than it did when previously misplaced within the diverse group of other varieties. Since there is no specific class for Yellow Faced Blue Albinos after Albinos and Lutinos were separated they are benched by default in the Blue Series Albino class, if people insist on benching them at all. They have been around ever since the two unrelated mutations were recognised back in the 1930's that shut down the melanin pathway (Albino) and significantly reduce psittacofulvin (Yellow Faced Blue). Nevertheless, a Yellow Faced Albino will beat the classic white Albinos on the show bench when it is sufficiently superior in Type to its competitors to cancel out its penalty for yellow suffusion. That should not be controversial if The Standard is read and interpreted correctly.

Improving A Stud Of Exhibition Budgerigars – Brian Poole UK

After a few years in the hobby most people will have reached the position when they have been able to dispose of their initial purchases and offspring and will want to be selective in their breeding requirements in order to compete against the top breeders. The aim will also probably be to work with several mainstream varieties. Success depends on several things and finance is one of these. Hopefully the breeder will have saved enough from the sale of birds or by other means, to buy when necessary and to buy birds that will upgrade his stock.

Pedigree plays a great part in breeding but when buying it should be the visual properties that decide your choice of bird. Good looking specimens more often produce their like than do those with a good pedigree but lacking that high quality appearance.

In terms of numbers, I think that 12 to 20 pairs plus up to a dozen good spare hens are the minimum necessary to be able to breed sufficient numbers in quality to be competitive on the show bench. If one specialises, with the exception of red-eyes, these numbers are probably not necessary but most specialists gradually branch out into the more mainstream varieties.

Hens Are The Dominating Factor

Particular attention should be paid to your hens as they are the dominating factor in the breeding cage and without good hens you area wasting your time. So many times a good cock bird is mated to an indifferent hen and the young produced are inferior. When it comes to hens the Opaline is essential for any stud and should play a substantial part in your plans. In all Opaline colours the broad heads, bold spots and substance make them a good choice and if you can get them with a clear mantle, so much the better. An excellent mating for the production of opalines is a split opaline cock with a deep mask paired to equally good opaline hen. The mating usually produces more hens than cocks but if they are good ones they can be kept as spare hens.

Another variety dear to my heart is the Cinnamon, having specialised in them for a number of years in the 1990's. Their pastel shades and fine feathering make them very pleasing to the eye and they are still one of my favourites. With Cinnamon I think it is easy to lose spot size and the necessary steps should be taken to prevent this, and here the Opaline and Opaline Cinnamon can be useful. Just like Opalines, the Cinnamons and Opaline Cinnamon can soon spread through your stock.

A Real Asset To A Stud

Grey and Grey Greens have done consistently well over the years must form part of a stud. A good Grey is a very attractive bird, but more often than not, has to give way to a Grey Green with the better top end that many have. Greys and Grey Greens can be successfully paired to all other colours and are a real asset to a stud.

A quality Light Green is one of the finest Budgerigars to look at and this colour is worth all the effort to get some good ones. Only a very few of our top breeders claim to be Light Green specialists and they produce some very good ones and I hopefully they will gradually come back into more prominence. As regards birds of Normal Blues, a stud is not complete without them being represented.

Having worked exclusively with Lutinos for a number of years I think it is difficult to progress with them without specialising or in a position to have a number of pairs in addition to the other varieties that can be inter-bred with them. With Lutinos it is not easy to keep colour, head and size up to standard when you are pairing Lutino to Lutino.
