TRICHOMONOSIS – SOUR CROP

What causes this disease?

This disease is caused by a protozoa, *Trichomonas gallinae*. The protozoa lives in the lining of the crop. However in severe cases, it can also infect the liver.

What Species are affected?

Several species can be affected by this disease. It is commonly seen in the budgerigar, pigeon, cockateil, and canary.

Transmission:

Birds acquire this condition by eating the protozoa. This can happen when:

- a) Parent birds feed the young;
- b) During courting behaviour where birds feed each other;
- c) Or by contamination of the food and water containers by the vomit or saliva of the bird.

The disease can be more likely to occur in young birds, particularly where overcrowding leads to poor hygiene. Other diseases, stress and poor nutrition can also allow this disease to affect the health of the bird.

What symptoms are seen?

- The most common change that is seen is evidence of vomiting or regurgitation. In birds, this is seen as matted feathers on top of the head or around the mouth.
- The bird may also find it difficult to eat, lose weight and become lethargic.
- However, there are other conditions that can cause similar signs in birds.

How does the veterinarian diagnose this disease?

A narrow tube is placed in the crop of the bird and a sample of fluid from the crop is taken. This is examined immediately under the microscope for the protozoa.

Unfortunately for some birds, this disease may be diagnosed at necropsy.

Treatment

Once your veterinarian has diagnosed this condition, a course of treatment will be prescribed. In water or oral medication may be used. Resistance to the protozoa can exist, so please follow the instructions carefully and revisit the veterinarian as recommended.

Prevention

Good hygiene is important. Provide clean water and food bowls and reduce overcrowding where possible. Your veterinarian may recommend a follow up treatment – particularly in breeding birds.



Food and Feeding Exhibition Budgerigars

PART 6: Greens

Sprouted seeds and grains are relished by budgerigars and provide valuable nutritional components. Carrot, corn, peas, spinach or silver beet supply vitamins and salt, which are essential for budgerigars. They must learn to eat greens and the best way to introduce it to them is to mix it with soft food when they have young in the nest. Once accustomed to greens the budgerigars will seek them out. Don't overdo the feeding of greens since when they go stale they can cause health problems.

Minerals: Minerals are essential for normal development and health of budgerigars. Minerals enter the composition of bone and give rigidity and strength to the skeleton to support soft tissues. They combine with protein and other substances to help form the body tissues. The following chart portrays the mineral content in some vegetables fed to budgerigars:

Calcium: Calcium plays a vital role in ensuring strong bones, is essential for growth, ensures efficient muscle contraction and regulates blood clotting. Calcium is most likely to be deficient in young birds. It is essential that budgerigars are supplied with calcium. Supplementary feeding of a recognised brand is advisable. Certain kidney and gut disorders could lead to deficiency of calcium owing to inadequate absorption, and brittle and easily fractured bones may result from this.

Fibre: Fibre is needed by budgerigars and most of their fibre requirements are found in a balanced seed diet. Fibre aids microorganisms to multiply, which in turn aids digestion and produces vitamin B12. If the percentage of fibre is greatly increased there is a tendency for impactions of the crop, gizzard and sometimes the intestines to occur. This is evident in badly nourished and debilitated birds. A diet high in fibre is often low in nutrients, and the functions of the gut are impaired. Insufficient fibre produces a small amount of pasty faeces which may matt the vent feathers or cause constipation. Treatment is to give a laxative, followed by a diet of soaked or sprouted seed.

SA BIRD CARER REPORT

National Show hosted by the Budgerigar Society of New South Wales, May 26-27, 2018 SA Bird Carers: John Mulley, Doug Lange and Michael Smith

A Team comprising 80 birds was selected to represent South Australia at Penrith, from 17 successful exhibitors out of the 26 who participated at the Logan Shield. Congratulations to everyone who had birds selected. There were late entries to the Logan Shield requiring changes to the staging layout to make room for them in a hall that is near capacity. There were entries on club entry forms rather than the required BCSA entry form that accompanied the BCSA show schedule, entries on neither entry form, and birds placed in cages not corresponding to their assigned ring numbers. As a general comment the show condition of many birds was less than optimal but this affected all state/zone teams due to birds approaching the end of their moult at this time of year, so this was beyond the control of breeders. There were no health issues in the Team prior to travel to Penrith, in transit to Penrith or at Penrith but one bird developed a wet vent during transit back to Adelaide requiring an overnight stay in a heated cage which cleared that up.

The SA birds performed well at the national show with final State/Zone scores as follows:

Nine classes were judged in each of three sessions: Saturday morning, Saturday afternoon and Sunday morning. The program for Saturday was extremely tight with all preparation for the birds needing to have been completed the day before. The carers from all Teams were still boxing the birds for the Saturday afternoon session when judging began on the first two afternoon classes. The extent of spotting for many of the SA birds, but not all, was minimal or non-existent. Some birds had so many spots including multiple shadow spots still in place that they should really have been spotted in several sessions over more than one day to ensure the right spots were pulled. Efforts by the clubs to address this problem have not yet succeeded. My advice to anyone who asks how to learn about spotting is to pick a bird from the aviary each weekend and have a go.

Birds rested undisturbed on the Thursday after their arrival at Penrith. We finalised the show preparation for all 80 birds on the Friday. As usual, lights on in the bird room allowed time for birds to feed prior to departing Adelaide, prior to placing into show cages at the show (the SA Bird Carers are the last to arrive in the bird room on the morning of the show to make sure birds have half an hour undisturbed to feed) and again prior to departing Penrith to ensure that the birds feed prior to their travel back home.

Placings within the top seven puts those birds into elite company. Looking at SA, there were two national winners, one second place and four third placings, all very commendable.

Firsts Normal Grey Green (Troy Holmes); Clearbody (J&W Weidenhofe

Second Dominant Pied (Kakoschke and Rice)

Thirds Normal Golden Faced Blue (J&W Weidenhofer); Dominant Pied (Dennis Lomman);

Normal Grey Green (Kakoschke and Rice)

Fifth Normal Green (John Mulley); Black Eyed Self (John Mulley); Lutino (J&W Weidenhofer);

Crested (Kakoschke and Rice)

Sixth Black Eyed Self (Jim Butterworth); Opaline (Kakoschke and Rice); Recessive Pied

(Malcolm Loveridge)

Seventh Clearwing (Kakoschke and Rice); Normal Yellow Faced Blue (J&W Weidenhofer);

Cinnamonwing (Kakoschke and Rice); Opaline (Kakoschke and Rice); Opaline AOSV

(J&W Weidenhofer); Recessive Pied (Malcolm Loveridge)

The above results contributed heavily to the SA score. Our strongest classes with two birds in the top seven were the Normal Grey Green, Black Eyed Self, Opaline, Dominant Pied and Recessive Pied.

Observations on some of the classes are as follows. The winner in the Normal Grey Green class had

a powerful cap with the judge commenting that is the direction that we need to be following with our birds. The Normal Golden Faced Blue class has progressed well with most entries now double factors. There were some interesting comments from the two judges of the clearwings. Henry George mentioned the ongoing conflict between variety and type, which clearwing breeders know full well. His judging partner the international judge Gerd Bleicher from Germany noted that in earlier visits to Australia he saw clearwings with excellent varietal features seen nowhere else in the world but now with type improving we are in danger of losing wing clarity. Interestingly, the winning clearwing from Victoria was strong in both type and variety (wing clarity). Both opaline classes demonstrated clearer than usual caps with flecking vastly diminished compared with what we have seen in past nationals and less melanin on the back of the neck. Breeders are sensing that serious moves are finally afoot to eliminate flecking from the show bench.

The following points were picked up after attendance at the National Judges Meeting on the Sunday afternoon. These comments are communicated pending official confirmation once minutes of the National Judges Meeting are released. Some think Australia should adopt the WBO Standard in place of the current Australian Standard. The WBO Standard has facial features said to be in advance of the Australian Standard, primarily with respect to directional feather extending well below and either side of the cere. [Care would need to be exercised to ensure this was not at the expense of losing frontal rise creating a flat face and some time ago at BCSA level it was considered that the WBO bird lacked distance behind the perch and looked so top heavy that it might fall off the perch!].

Another interesting point relates to the Australian White Cap. There is great excitement around this new colour mutation, if it is a colour mutation, as nobody really knows other than speculation that possibly it could be a mutation derived from Yellow Faced Blue. There is enthusiasm for bringing it in as a Development Class at the nationals in 2019, 2020 and 2021 with a decision then to be made about adding it to the national show schedule. Opinion appeared to be divided as to its inclusion into The Matrix below Golden Faced Blue to be exhibited as part of the Normal Series or whether to slot it just above the Crested position, at least in the first instance which would include all varietal combinations. There was a suggestion that a working party be set up comprising prominent breeders of White Caps, of which there are now quite a number, to make recommendations to the ANBC.

The most important advance of immediate importance to most of us, since we are about to start breeding, relates to flecking. It appears that only in Australia is this still tolerated on the show bench. A survey carried out among the nationally accredited judges has led to a consensus. Pictorials will be issued for guidance depicting examples of heavy flecking versus light flecking, to come into effect most likely from January 1, 2019. Heavy flecking will be disqualified, which would be a massive step forward. Light flecking will be penalised, the heavier the "light" flecking the heavier the penalty. Where the determination of degree of flecking is difficult to make, then that bird will be disqualified since it does not clearly fit into the "light" flecking group. After a yet to be determined timeframe the aim will be to eventually eliminate light flecking. That cannot be implemented immediately because too many birds would suddenly be eliminated. Heavy flecking incurring disqualification in simple terms can be described as SPOTS of melanin within the cap. Light flecking incurring penalty in simple terms can be described as SLIVERS of melanin on the cap, which we generally refer to as ticking. Slivers in every feather would fit into a grey zone and as such be disqualified. Conceivably, "light" flecking today might be regarded as "heavy" flecking in five years' time.

The three points outlined above require confirmation through official ANBC, BCSA and club channels. Given that we are all now on a tightly coiled spring ready to start breeding then the time is now to let breeders know what is on the horizon. Whilst the above goes beyond what is generally the scope of a Bird Carer Report it is hoped that the additional information is timely and informative.
