Much needs to be put into place over the next year and a half. Don't listen to anyone who thinks it's too early. Avian Gastric Yeast (AGY), previously known as Mega bacteria, is an introduced avian disease that we as budgie breeders know only too well. Sadly, it has now been identified as existing in wild native parrots in and around Perth WA. The following article tells the sad tale.

The article was too big, in terms of text length and megabytes, to include in its entirety. The Avian Gastric Yeast Experience

ABSTRACT

The Ascomycetes yeast *Macrorhabdus ornithogaster* is an organism that can only grow at the juncture between the proventriculus and ventriculus in birds. A wide variety of bird species, including Australian native parrots, can become infected with *M. ornithogaster*. It was originally thought that this organism was a large bacterium, hence the name "mega bacteria" but recent studies suggest that it is actually a yeast. It is sometimes referred to as "avian gastric yeast" or "AGY" and is sometimes, but not always, associated with a chronic wasting disease. Approximately 2800 animals are admitted to the Kanyana Wildlife Rehabilitation Centre, Perth every year, of which about 16% are parrots. Since 1994, Kanyana has had a team of experienced microscopists who conduct microscopic examinations on the faeces of many of the animals that are admitted into the centre. Faecal samples are routinely collected from parrots on admission and screened for AGY. In-house microscopy has been found to be a useful tool to aid in the identification and treatment of parrots with AGY. Incidence rates and disease trends amongst various parrot species will be discussed as well as the current treatment regime used at Kanyana Wildlife Rehabilitation Centre. Case studies will also be presented.

INTRODUCTION

Approximately 2800 animals are admitted annually to the Kanyana Wildlife Rehabilitation Centre, Perth, of which about 16% are parrots. Since 2000, Kanyana has had a team of volunteers who conduct microscopic examinations on the faeces of many of the animals that are admitted into the centre. During 2014/2015, 824 parrots (comprising rainbow lorikeets, galahs, red-capped parrots, Australian ringnecks and little corellas) were admitted into the centre. We try to do a direct smear on the faeces of all parrots as soon as possible after admission. Avian gastric yeast (AGY) only grows in the gastric isthmus of a bird's stomach (the junction between the proventriculus and ventriculus) (Tomaszewski et al., 2003). It was originally thought to be yeast (Dorrestein et al., 1980) because of the way it stained. Later, others concluded that it was a large bacteria-like organism (van Herck etal., 1984; Scanlan and Graham, 1990), hence the name "Mega bacteria". In 2003, Tomaszewski et al. genetically characterized the organism and proved that it is yeast. It is sometimes referred to as "AGY" but now it is known as *Macrorhabdus ornithogaster*. Birds infected with AGY often show signs of a chronic wasting disease. In budgerigars the chronic wasting condition is seen most commonly in middle-aged birds and is called "going light" (Baker, 1985).

HOST RANGE

AGY infects many different species of birds (van Herck et al., 1984), including a wide range of psittacine birds. It has been found worldwide in both wild and captive bred birds of all ages

(Dorrestein et al., 1980; Phalen, 2005; Martins et al., 2006). AGY is common in captive-raised budgerigars, finches, lovebirds and canaries. It has also been reported in chickens, quails, partridges, turkeys, ostriches and rheas (Martins et al., 2006). At Kanyana, we have identified the organism in a pet budgerigar (Melopsittacus undulates), weiros (Nymphicus hollandicus), Japanese quails (Coturnix japonica), Gouldian finches (Erythrura gouldiae), galahs (Eolophus roseicapillus), Australian ringneck parrots or twenty-eights (Barnardius zonarius), red-capped parrots (Purpureicephalus spurius), little corellas (Cacatua sanguinea), western rosellas (Platycercus icterotis), rainbow lorikeets (Trichoglossus haematodus) and domestic canaries (Serinus canaria). To date we have not seen AGY in any other wild bird species including redtailed black-cockatoos (Calyptorhynchus banksii), Carnaby's black-cockatoos (Calyptorhynchus latirostris), common bronzewing pigeons (Phaps chalcoptera), domestic pigeons (Columba livia), laughing turtle-doves (Streptopelia senegalensis) and spotted turtle-doves (Streptopelia chinensis). Of the 824 parrots admitted, 485 (59%) were screened for parasites, including AGY (see Chart 1 below). The other 41% of parrots either died before a faecal sample was collected or were euthanased on admission. Approximately 22% of the parrots admitted to Kanyana were admitted due to illness, 19% were admitted due to trauma of unknown origin, 23% were admitted as a result of being struck by a motor vehicle, 6% due to domestic animal attack and 17% were admitted with their reason of admission being unknown. The remaining parrots (13%) were admitted due to other reasons such as impact injury, displaced due to habitat destruction, escaped pet or poisoning.




Chart 1: Parrot admissions for 2014/2015

Powder coating of chrome show cage fronts Last run – last chance

From 2020 onwards (next year!) show cages will need to have powder coated cage fronts so as not to be disqualified at NEBS shows and the Logan Shield state selection show.

The deadline for this passed some years ago but the BCSA extended the deadline to enable completion of the change. Most of us made the change some years ago but for anyone who has not done this for all of their cages I will be collecting the old chrome fronted cage fronts at the November club meeting. This absolutely will be your last chance. November has been chosen to allow existing cages to be available for the UBC show in October. I will however take cage fronts before this if that suits, but the one run of powder coating will not take place until after the November meeting.

Please tie your batch of cage fronts together and label with your name. Cost per cage front will be determined by the number of cage fronts collected from the three SA clubs. Some years ago, this was \$2.20 each. This time we will not have a price until we know the number of cage fronts in the run. The alternative is to purchase new cage fronts from the Trading Table at about \$8.50 each (to be confirmed).

Thank you to the North East Budgerigar Society for your continued support Malcolm Loveridge A further question and answer from the proceedings of the International Forum as part of the 2007 ANBC Show hosted in Adelaide by the BCSA with comment at the end on the context of the answer fast forwarded to 2019.

INTERNATIONAL FORUM

On the Tuesday evening (29th May) of the 2007 ANBC Nationals held in Adelaide South Australia, a very interesting forum was attended by about sixty fanciers.

The forum panel were Marcel Buhler from Switzerland: Ricky Watts from The United Kingdom: Warren Wilson from New South Wales: Alan Gamble from New Zealand: Ron Pearce from The United Kingdom.

Question from Leigh Downey: We were in the UK in 2002 and watched the UK show in Doncaster and would like to ask Ron, who was the chief steward, about the final judging of the Doncaster show compared to the judging of our show.

Ron Pearce: The question is not really fair as you have a completely different system to us. At our club show, we had about 4500 birds so we couldn't possibly do it like you do it. Also, we don't have Zones and we don't have one state compete against another state, it is a completely individual show. We would start judging the 4500 birds at 8am and have it finished by 1pm but we have seventeen or eighteen judges. It is a very streamlined system we have. It turns from one award to the other. The BS has set out how the show is to be run and that is how it is run. I was quite impressed with your set up and the technology you have, although I found it quite slow, and you can't compare with the UK the numbers or whatever.

Marcel Buhler *was asked to comment as well:* I think in Switzerland we hold a similar show to England. Normally at the Nationals we have 1000 birds with four judges. We commence at 7am and finish at 12 o'clock. It is run to a different system to you with colour classes going to groups then to main groups and then best in show. We could never get a chance to run a show like you have here. It would be very hard to get areas together as we only have 160 members so there is no chance of your type of competition being available. The show here has been a wonderful experience for me as a judge.

Warren Wilson. We have to bear in mind that our type of national show as a team thing is not something they are used to seeing overseas. In those countries they would be very happy if they could have a show run like this but are unable because of the geography. When I judged one of their (UK) shows in July last year, the whole thing was over in three hours. The judge doesn't even do much of the paperwork. The chief steward is there to do it. Everything is pre prepared and the only thing the judge does is mark the cages and, in some cases, he doesn't even do that. It is very fast. For those of you who do most of our ordinary annual shows, then it is nothing like what we do here. The system is entirely different. Steward is virtually standing within inches of the judge the whole time. They are not used to comparing the way we judge our national show which we have to bear in mind is completely different to how we judge our annual shows.

Alan Gamble: It is quite interesting to see both sides. I have been fortunate to judge in England and was very impressed with the standard of the stewards and how quick everything went. I must admit it didn't put any pressure on me either. Whilst it was very fast, and the time I judged there were 4700 birds benched, with nineteen judges from all around the world, we started at 9am and finished at 1pm. It was phenomenal but no pressure – it was just quick. When it came to picking the top birds, they treat that as a form of secrecy, and you couldn't talk with each other or wheel and deal with each other to try and get the bird you particularly like. They keep rotating the judges so there is no closeness between you and the other judges, and we ended up with most of the decisions being unanimous.



I was very fortunate that out of the five top awards three of them came from the yellow face classes that I judged. That doesn't mean to say I am a hell of a good judge, but it does mean that I drew the best straw and had the best class to look at. When I look at what happens in Australia compared to what happens in New Zealand then I envy you people. Now that we are part of it, we can not only come over and enjoy your Nationals, we are going to have more of a gain out of it. You have this comradeship that I don't think you realise. It starts off with your clubs, then your own Zone challenges, it was great to be part of the South Australian selection this year to see each club get together, to work together for one common factor. To make their club the best club in their state challenge. I am telling you what you already know.

Then you have the states competing against each other, the excitement or disappointment – whichever way you put it - at the competition this weekend – to have only five points between your top two teams – and yet you were probably shaking hands and patting each other on the back the people you hardly spoke to all year but suddenly you were all together. What you have in Australia is brilliant – don't ever change the system. We are looking forward in New Zealand to one day being part of that competition. I was so proud yesterday that there was such a unanimous vote to let us come on board. Probably one of the biggest thrills I have ever had in this hobby. So, don't compare with what they have in the UK and Europe to what you have here, but don't ever lose that comradeship and try and work together. It is very obvious when you hear people talking, you hear the wheeling and dealing, you are all trying to get to a greater level. I think it is fantastic and carry on the good work - thankyou.

Editorial comment in the context of 2019:

format of our national show has not changed since 2007 – apart from getting bigger – with three birds now benched from each state or zone instead of two and significantly more classes. That means the program is now more intense since there are still only the two sets of two judges with the 21 birds in each class being judged in about half an hour - about the same time that I recall it previously took to judge the 14 birds in each class. I am not sure why? The big difference of course between 2007 and now is the price that is paid for the birds at the national auction, fewer breeders in SA and fewer and older helpers in SA.

At the time of writing this report I am not privy to our financial position however we must be ever vigilant to ensure our viability is ongoing.

BCSA Treasurer Report 2018-19

The financial position of the BCSA at the end of the 2018-2019 financial year is set out on the balance sheet. The amount of \$60,338.53 compares favourably with \$57,688.04 at the same time last year.

The increase can be partially accounted for with three rather than the usual two interest payments generated by the Term Deposit which at maturity was reinvested for shorter than usual periods to take advantage of the highest available interest rates.

The amount in the Investment Account upon which interest is earned is actively maximized by minimizing cash held in the Operating Account.

However, the major increase in funds over the past 12 months was attributed to a donation of \$2,520.85 from Mount Gambier Budgerigar Society after it was wound up. The BCSA thanks Mount Gambier Budgerigar Society for their generosity. The understanding is that if the Mount Gambier Club is revived the BCSA will assist that process with similar assistance back to them.

The only significant recurring sources of revenue continue to be BCSA memberships which remain stable and commission from the annual auction. Significant expenses continue to be honorariums associated with the national show each year which partially recovers personal expenses incurred by Bird Carers and Delegates, and Logan Shield expenses primarily associated with the provision of 84 rosettes. The Australian National Budgerigar Council now reimburses half of the freight costs incurred by sending the SA Team to the national show.

Looking ahead we are now less than two years out from hosting the national show in Adelaide. Beyond that, the BCSA will need to elect a new Treasurer to familiarise themselves with the BCSA finances prior to future national shows hosted by the BCSA. Back in 2014 there were not enough volunteers to take responsibility to cover all positions needed to host the show. For the 2021 show volunteers are still needed from the membership to take responsibility for many of the roles currently listed in the BCSA Minutes. Alternatively, BCSA funds will need to be run down to cover the costs of outsourcing some of the functions.

The financial future and hence ongoing viability of the BCSA is in your hands.
