BIRD CARER REPORT FROM THE MANDURAH NATIONAL SHOW 2015

The three SA bird carers for 2015 were John Mulley, Ian Marshall and Doug Lange. Twenty three of 29 exhibitors at the Logan Shield had at least one bird selected in the 80 strong Team that we took away. The 22 birds from one exhibitor formed the backbone of the Team. Spotting is an essential part of exhibiting budgerigars and most exhibitors complied to the extent that we requested on the show schedule. Spotting was of a very high standard from some exhibitors but a few made no attempt. Some did not use the entry form supplied with the show schedule to enter their birds, some do not supply ring numbers and some omit their required personalised ring code when they do supply their ring numbers meaning that the volunteers who manage the show have to waste their time chasing up these details.

Use of the reserve set of BCSA carry cages for transporting the Team from the Logan Shield to the holding area greatly simplified this operation. This and drop off of the remaining birds the day before departure went smoothly. All birds were chirpy with firm tails with none scratched before departure.

The expanded Team (now up to 81 birds with extra classes and three birds benched) were comfortably accommodated in the new and larger BCSA travel cages. Potential flight delays will no longer be a worry for us now that the birds have adequate space to be accommodated for an extended period. The BCSA hired an SUV at Perth airport to provide own transport to minimise delays between the airport and the national show venue and to facilitate Bird Carer movement between accommodation and the show venue given the early starts and distance between accommodation and the show venue.

One bird had to be scratched on show day. Multiple blood feathers concealed under a layer of mature cap feathers had ruptured during travel and it wasn't possible to repair the damage to enable that one bird to be benched. We notified the owner on the day. SA was the only State/Zone unable to bench three dark eyed clears as this composite variety hasn't caught on in SA. The extra birds and extra classes necessitated splitting the benching and judging of birds on the first day into morning and afternoon sessions with only an hour changeover to clean cages and bench the afternoon set. This was hectic but achievable with good organisation from the show officials and the Bird Carers from all seven States/Zones.

The SA birds in most classes were generally placed in the same order as judged at the Logan Shield, allowing for the fact that similar birds closely positioned at one show can easily swap positions at the next show. Judging of the crest class against the new Crested Standard was educational. Apart from crests needing to be centrally placed full circles, their feather density within the crest has to be such that there is no longer any doubt about it being the most prominent feature of the variety. Similar corrective actions to other parts of The Standard might be useful to reinforce varietal features in some of the other classes. Every bird gets a rosette which makes it a challenge to bring 80 rosettes back without incurring excess baggage costs. SA is only next door to WA but despite that it was noticeable that our state had very few supporters attending the show.

Pickup of birds went smoothly back in Adelaide with everyone collecting their birds when they said they would. SA will be down one of the regular away Bird Carers for Hobart next year, so that provides an opportunity to introduce new blood. The replacement needs to be able to spot and manage birds, or be enthusiastic enough to learn and to contribute with the aim to become a regular member of the Team. Someone from within the group of 23 successful SA exhibitors at the Logan Shield would be a good place to look for such a person.

To conclude, the standard of birds at Mandurah across all classes was extraordinarily high, possibly because the 2015 show birds were rung with black rings over two breeding seasons producing a larger than usual population of budgerigars from which to select for exhibition.

CINNAMONWING

: Bird of the month for July 2015

The Cinnamonwing was recognised as a distinct variety in Australia, England and Germany at about the same time, around 1934. The first Cinnamonwing seen in Australia were bred in Adelaide in 1933. The mode of inheritance is sex-linked recessive, meaning that only the cocks can be split Cinnamonwing, that is, carry Cinnamonwing in a concealed form. For hens, insofar as Cinnamonwing is concerned, what you see is what it is.

The distribution of markings in Cinnamonwing is the same as we see in Normals, but the markings differ in colour. The black markings seen in Normals are replaced with brown cinnamon markings caused by a mutation shutting down one of the two types of melanin responsible for black markings in the Normals. The Cinnamonwing mutation also affects feather structure and reduces body colour to less than full intensity. Therefore the variety can be used as a genetic modifier in striving for perfection in certain other varieties. For example, Blackeyed self's are usually bred on a Cinnamonwing background in order to dampen the markings and reduce body colour suffusion. Generally spangle double factors are bred on a Cinnamonwing background in order to eliminate body colour suffusion.

I have issue with the naming of this variety. I don't see it as a wing variety akin to clearwings since the markings in the Cinnamonwing are present ubiquitously. They are not restricted to the markings in the wings. The name should be cinnamon, dropping off the "wing".

The other issue I have is the myth that to improve feather structure one should breed birds "through Cinnamonwing". In reality the feather structure is altered only if the birds are Cinnamonwing. A bird's feather structure depends on the variety and is unaffected by a birds ancestry unless the gene itself is transmitted to affect the appearance. Having Cinnamonwing ancestry, unless the bird itself has received the Cinnamonwing gene and is a Cinnamonwing, has no effect on feather structure. In other words, long ago the Lamarkian theory of inheritance of acquired characters was superseded by Mendelian genetics.

Myth Busters – As collected by Terry Tuxford – Don't believe everything you are told!

Have you noticed how the "wisdom" which permeates our hobby is passed down virtually unchallenged through the years? An idea proposed by expert "A" in his "How To Breed Budgerigars Book", is later picked up and endorsed by expert "B". Then, ten years later, expert "C" gives it the final stamp of approval with an introduction that begins; "Experienced breeders recommend...".

In this article I will be exploring these beliefs and exposing those that are little more than unsubstantiated opinion. Should any reader wish to contribute to these I eagerly await your input as we – "Bust the Budgerigar Myths."

Egg, milk and milk powders are suitable bases for soft food.

Ask any laboratory worker and you will be told that one of the best mediums for culturing bacteria is milk. Remember too, that we are advised to ensure that the eggs are hard boiled. Well, my digestive system is reasonably robust, certainly more versatile than that of any Budgerigar but if you offered me the choice between a hard and a soft boiled egg, I know which one I would choose. We hard boil the eggs so that it crumbles and is easier for the birds to pick up, not because it is intrinsically better for them that way. Try lightly scrambling them next time you want to mix your soft food. You will find them easier to work with and the birds will enjoy them just as much.

Budgerigars are seed eaters, they consume very little else!



Budgerigars Eating Mealworms

Not true I am afraid. Budgerigars are cannibals at times. A nesting hen will happily consume a small chick which dies in the nest and have you seen what the flock will do to the corpse of a bird which dies in the flight? They always go for the head first – I wonder why? They will also snap up any insect or spider which is foolhardy enough to come within reach, a habit which can result in the occasional puzzling intestinal upset as the insect's defenses take effect.

Strict breeding room, cage and nest hygiene are essential for the production of healthy chicks!

The consequence of this is that our birds have lost their natural resistance to disease and/or that the modern day infections and viruses are more virulent than those of yesterday. Both propositions have some validity and I am not going to argue that hygiene is not important but I do suspect that sometimes we get carried away and take our precautions to ridiculous extremes. I have been in birdrooms where the cleaning programmes were so strict that I was tempted to look in the corner of the cages for the miniature bathroom facilities, where the air was pungent with the odour of disinfectants and extractor fans whipped into the great outdoors all feathers and dust particles which the ionisers did not bring tumbling to the floors. I cannot help wondering whether the hygiene routines in such establishments are planned for the benefit of the birds or to satisfy the fastidious tastes of the owners.

I fear that we may well be inadvertently suppressing our bird's natural resistance to disease. There was a time when our breeding pairs raised large numbers of healthy chicks in cages, nest boxes and bird rooms designed and managed to provide the most natural surroundings. The disturbance associated with cleaning were kept to a minimum – usually a quiet daily once over, followed by a more thorough clean out at the end of each round, when the comfort of the birds was paramount.

We all know the discomfort we feel when a house proud host or hostess straightens and rearranges the cushions as soon as we rise from the chair. Are we sacrificing the comfort, the peace and quiet of our breeding birds, controlling their environment and perhaps stressing them needlessly, to satisfy our concern about diseases which may, or may not, affect their health or our own.

Do not disturb the eggs in the nest!

We are advised that the hen will position her eggs carefully with the oldest towards the outside and the most recently laid towards the centre. Now that is interesting. Clever little creatures are they not? Do we really believe that a hen who will sit for up to 26 days on a clutch of infertile eggs, who will defend these useless products against all perceived threats and who clearly does not know when she is wasting her time, is somehow smart enough to successfully identify each egg in the clutch and rotate it according to some predetermined pattern?

Those of us who number the eggs in sequence as they are laid, can tell you that this apparently logical theory is almost certainly a fiction. I inspect the nest boxes twice a day and I can assure you that I have never seen an identifiable pattern in the way the eggs lie in the nest. Egg number one can be found this morning in the center of the clutch with number two and five. This evening it may be towards the outer in company with numbers three and four. The egg laid today may be in the center of the clutch, but it can equally be found at the very outer edges. I suspect that rather than following a well-planned rotation routine, the hen simply becomes uncomfortable, rises, shuffles and turns her clutch indiscriminately and then settles on them again. If we accept the alternative propositions that the shuffling is completely random, then the ultimate effect would be the same as if the hen had followed the suggested imprinted behaviour.

When fostering eggs or chicks, beware of possible rejection by the receiving hen!



Healthy Chicks

Another over-stated danger. It has been my impression over many years of successfully transferring both eggs and chicks that Budgerigar hens cannot count. It is clear that most Budgerigars have very little idea of either quantity; the number of eggs in a nest, or capacity; the size and feeding demands of their clutches. Show an incubating hen an egg and she will sit on it. Put a hungry chick in the nest, assuming its age and size are similar to their own, the pair will feed it.

In the days when I took the experts advice and closely supervised all transfers, I experienced the occasional rejection. I suspect that I caused most of the trouble myself by disturbing the foster pairs. Now I leave them well alone and have few failures.

Budgerigar breeding, like all livestock hobbies, is meant to be enjoyed. Of course we should do everything in our power to ensure that our charges are well cared for, kept free of sickness and diseases and given the best possible housing. Let us not forget, however, that they are birds and not humans.

Pairing Skills – Terry Tuxford UK

Selecting pairs of budgerigars, which breed youngsters of quality, is a skill which makes the difference between success and failure for the exhibitor. Occasionally luck occurs and produces a winner from an apparently poorly matched pair. However, producing winners year after year suggests that something more than luck is at work. Even so, when a carefully chosen pair breeds a top quality youngster it often also produces brothers and sisters which are not so visually appealing.

It is important to make a distinction between show birds and stock birds. Most show birds are well balanced and attractive to the eye and portray as many of the positive features of an exhibition budgerigars as is possible. A good stock bird however, has a surplus of some feature such as height above the perch, browiness and thickness through the neck. Unfortunately, countering the excess of a desirable feature there is usually a fault such as bad wing carriage, so giving the impression of imbalance.

Chicks of Less Quality



Nature has the habit of regressing from an excess and the outstanding features of any Budgerigar tend to be diluted in its young. Even two well balanced show birds usually produce chicks of less quality than themselves when paired together. Loss of size is the problem most often encountered in the young of such mating's. Spreading desirable qualities through a stud dilutes them. If we could find a way of increasing a desirable quality we would have solved the problem of consistently breeding top quality livestock, but nature is not so obliging.

When selecting breeding pairs today we must take into account flecking, which was not so much of a concern when I first came into the fancy and we cannot afford to ignore it in the breeding room. Intelligence needs to be employed when using flecked Budgerigars in breeding programs or else we could lose the beautiful clean caps that the best exhibition birds possess. Many breeders believe there is a link between flecking and quality, and this is much stronger in hens than it is in cocks. Hens with grizzled caps are often far ahead of their clean counterparts in respect to

overall head qualities and size.

This is far less true of cocks. Grizzled males are seldom ahead of clean ones in quality. For this reason it makes sense to limit the flecked Budgerigars in the breeding team to hens, which also ensures that flecking is limited to one side of each pairing only. Even this is not completely foolproof as some Budgerigars carry the fault of flecking recessively in hidden form.

No Place in Any Stud

A quality Budgerigar that is flecked can bring benefits to a stud but flecked individuals of only average quality have no place in any stud at all. Some fanciers buy in a flecked Budgerigar in the belief that quality is always allied with the fault as they believe that their studs will be improved. In most cases they may increase the size of their Budgerigars' throat spots but the problems they introduce completely outweigh the benefits. A flecked headed hen will often produce clean headed cocks but which in turn breed dirty-headed daughters.

It would be best if all pairings consisted of two clean headed partners but unfortunately such individuals capable of breeding winners are few and far between. If they can be obtained they are priceless and should never be put with flecked partners.

When selecting pairings, my considerations are influenced mainly by what I can see followed by what I know about the family from where they came from. When an outcross is brought in, more account must be taken of visual properties due to your lack of knowledge of its pedigree than that of one of your own birds. Some breeders will bring in an outcross but then use it with the lesser quality birds in the stud. This is just crazy because if a budgerigar is worth obtaining then it is worth the best partner you can find.

Getting Down To Basics



Whatever methodology you use in selecting pairings in the bird room you need to get down to basics. Each of my breeding cages is fully prepared with sufficient food and water to minimize disturbance of the pairs for their first few days together.

The cocks in my breeding team will have been selected as a matter of course in the months prior to breeding through daily observation. My first consideration is overall quality and only the top cocks are used for breeding. Some pairings select themselves because they were very successful the previous year. I have heard it said that little progress will be made if pairings are repeated from year to year. My view is why change a good thing when you've got one.

The cocks are placed into their breeding cages and the most suitable hens are selected from the flights. Of course fitness does govern the timing of this activity. It is usual that the best cock is paired with the best hen but even so, this does not often produce the top quality

youngsters. Top quality Budgerigars are paired and produce chicks which are useful but not outstanding. The best youngsters come from the young of the top quality parents from the following year. So the Budgerigars retained and used for breeding are not always the best looking ones. Very often it is the brothers and sisters of the most striking individuals who breed the specials winners. This situation has been confirmed by breeders for many years.

A Change in Partner

Once paired and seen to be getting on together, the Budgerigars are left. To get full eggs followed by chicks requires the cooperation of both the cock and the hen and if a pairing fails it can be either bird that is at fault. There are times when a change in partner is needed. Some cocks just do not have the libido to stimulate the hen into successful mating. I am never too quick to return a hen to the flight as a failure. I try another cock as a partner first. Introducing a new partner to any Budgerigar calls for vigilance in case there is fighting and this is even more important when one partner has already reared a nest of chicks. In my experience a hen which has reared accepts a new partner more readily than a cock in the same situation. To minimize the risk of problems it is best to put the pair into a cage which is new to both the cock and the hen. However, make sure the nest box is in the same location.

Many of the problems encountered during the course of the breeding season are caused by imposing your selection of a cock to a particular hen. Of course doing this is essential to any pedigree livestock breeding program and so the difficulties have to be accepted and attempts made to overcome them.
